
DOCTORAL PROGRAMS

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN EDUCATION (Ph.D.) DOCTOR OF EDUCATION LEADERSHIP (Ed. L.D.) Doctor of Education (Ed.D.)



DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN EDUCATION-Ph.D.

- Goal: train aspiring academics, researchers, policymakers, and leaders to improve education through novel research
- **Typical Components:** coursework, research apprenticeship, comprehensive exams, and dissertation that contributes novel research
- **Typical Completion:** 4-7 years, depending on dissertation timeline*
- Ideal Candidates: those with strong academic preparation and prior research experience, often at the master's level



DOCTOR OF EDUCATION LEADERSHIP-Ed.L.D.

- Goal: Prepare graduates to lead system-level transformation of the American PreK-12 education by leveraging organizational management skills, effective leadership strategies, a firm understanding of policy and politics, and visionary ideas regarding learning and development.
- **Typical Components:** Cohort-wide coursework (Y1), Individualized electives (Y2), Residency and Capstone (Y3)
- Completion Timeline: 3 years
- Ideal Candidates: Emerging education leaders with substantial professional experience and commitment to improving equity



DOCTOR OF EDUCATION-Ed.D.

- Goal: train aspiring leaders to solve practical problems within education by applying research, leadership best practices, and professional expertise
- Typical Components: coursework, examinations, dissertation or applied project
- Typical Completion: 3-7 years, depending on capstone requirements
- Ideal Candidates: those with substantial professional experience and sometimes a master's degree

What is valued within the Admissions process? At HGSE, we assess:

- Commitment to positive impact on the field
- Relevant preparation
 - Academic ability
 - Professional accomplishments
 - Training, skills, and research experience
- Fit with program and HGSE mission
- Both what you will gain and what you can contribute





DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN EDUCATION

- Interfaculty program offered through the Harvard Griffin Graduate School of Arts and Sciences
- Prepares academics, researchers, policymakers, and leaders who will improve education through rigorous scholarship
- Students complete a dissertation exploring original research
- 3 Concentrations
 - Culture, Institutions, and Society (CIS)
 - Education Policy and Program Evaluation (EPPE)
 - Human Development, Learning and Teaching (HDLT)



ACADEMIC ROADMAP – THE FIRST TWO YEARS

Students must complete a minimum of 64 credits/16 courses toward the degree, along with other academic and research-related requirements including:

- PhD Proseminar in Education (Year 1 fall; 1 course)
- Concentration Core Seminar (Year 1 spring; 1 course)
- Foundational Quantitative Methods Courses (2 courses)
- Foundational Qualitative Methods Course (1 course)
- Additional Qualitative Methods Course (1 course)
- Concentration Electives (3 courses)
- General Electives (5 courses)
- Research Apprenticeship (each year)
- Reading Time (written comprehensive exam preparation; Year 2 spring, 1 course)
- Written Comprehensive Examination (Year 2 spring)
- Research Colloquia (Years 1 and 2; 1 course per year)



ACADEMIC ROADMAP YEAR THREE

- Any outstanding coursework
- Oral Comprehensive Examination
- Research apprenticeship
- Teaching Fellow appointment(s) (four "slots" required at HGSE, typically fulfilled in Years 3 and 4)
- Research Colloquium presentation (Year 3, 4, 5, or 6)

ACADEMIC ROADMAP YEARS FOUR-SIX

- Dissertation Proposal (to be completed by the end of Year 4)
- Research apprenticeship
- Teaching Fellow appointment(s) (four "slots" required at HGSE, typically fulfilled in Years 3 and 4)
- Dissertation Committee Meeting (Year 4 or 5)
- Dissertation and Dissertation Defense (Year 4, 5, or 6)

YEARS 1 AND 2 Tuition, health fees, and stipend

YEARS 3 AND 4 Tuition, health fees, and guaranteed income through teaching and research assistantships

YEAR 5 Tuition and health fees

DISSERTATION COMPLETION YEAR Tuition, health fees, and stipend





DOCTOR OF EDUCATION LEADERSHIP

- Three-year practice-based doctorate
- Prepares graduates to lead system-level transformation of the American PreK-12
 education sector
- Full-time, in-person program
 - Year 1: Cohort-wide coursework (HGSE)
 - Year 2: Individualized electives (HGSE)
 - Year 3: Residency and Capstone (at residency)



- Personal Statement for Ph.D.
- Doctoral to Ed.M. referral option

APPLICATION STRATEGIES



LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

Choose individuals who know you well

Letters should address both academic and professional abilities

Ask your recommenders far in advance

You may want to provide recommenders with additional contextreason for pursuing graduate school, a draft of your statement of purpose, your resume

You cannot be involved in the drafting, writing, or submitting of your letters

Recommendation letters must be submitted by the application deadline





STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

For the Ph.D. application, describe your area of research and the need for this work

Demonstrate how this specific program will help you achieve them

Don't rehash your resume

Edit and ask for feedback

Remember this is also a writing sample





STRONG STATEMENTS OF PURPOSE

- Introduction to the candidate
- Mission/commitment to improve outcomes in education
- How relevant academic and professional experiences have prepared you and inspired you
- Goals for graduate study and long-term impact
- How this [articular school/program can help you achieve your goals]



PH.D. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

- Potential research
 - What experiences led you to your research ambitions?
 - Why is there a need for further research in this area?
 - How do you anticipate your research fitting in within the larger education sector?
- You may indicate which faculty you would like to study with

- What specific components of the program do you foresee helping you reach your goals?


